## **Sąsiadujemy**®

Neighbourhood is a programme of animation and cultural activities in Wrocław's housing estates run by the Strefa Kultury Wrocław (Wrocław Cultural Zone). For several years we have encouraged the residents of Kleczków, Brochów, Ołbin and Oławskie Przedmieście to get to know each other and build neighbourly relations. Since 2021 we have also included Huby, Różanka and Gajowice in our backyard activities. We continue to walk around the nooks of the housing estates with the city guide, Szymon Maraszewski, who plays the lead role in two seasons of the series "Tales from the housing estates". You can watch all the episodes on the website, Facebook and YouTube of Strefa Kultury Wrocław.

In 2021 we also invited the residents of Oławskie Przedmieście, Ołbin, Kleczków, Brochów, Księży, Nadodrze, Świdnickie Przedmieście and Grunwaldzki Square to co-create with us neighbourhood maps of these housing estates. No one knows as many stories about the neighbourhood as our male and female neighbours, so we spent several months collecting various stories about the most interesting, beautiful and peculiar places in the neighbourhood. Thanks to our joint efforts, you can now look at eight Wrocław housing estates through the eyes of their inhabitants get to know their memories and present-day stories, as well as discover spaces that no longer exist.

Take the map in your hand and follow the trail of your male and female neighbours! Remember that each map is available in three languages: Polish, English and Ukrainian.

Today, Księże covers the area of several former villages: Księże Mały, Księże Wielki, Świątniki, Opatowice, Bierdzany and the settlement of Nowy Dom. As many as four rivers flow through the settlement: the Brochówka, the Zielona, the Upper and the Lower Oława, as well as the Opatowice Canal

The oldest part of the settlement is Opatowice with its sluice and canal. It is a very popular recreation area among male and female inhabitants of the whole Wrocław. Świątniki is mainly a water area with two pumping stations: one of them is historic and the other still

Ksieże is exceptionally rich in flora and fauna. Ducks, swans, herons, roe deer, beavers, otters, weasels, ermine - these animal neighbours can often be found during walks in the green parts of the estate. An important place of rest mong the residents of Księże Wielkie is

In turn, Księże Wielkie used to be associated with very large meadows. Due to its proximity to wetlands, for many years it was not an attractive place for development. For some years now, however new buildings have been erected there. At the meeting point between Ksieży Mały and Księży Wielki there is a modernist housing complex built between 1928 and 1930, designed by Paul Heim and Albert Kempter in cooperation with Gustav Wolf, Hans Thomas and Rudolf Sack. It was the first rational, exemplary establishment of its kind in Breslau at the time. This created 762 flats for over 3000 people, as well as shops, a central heating boiler house with a bath and aundry, a meeting room for the local workshops. The buildings are quite similar to each other, so ceramic bas-reliefs depicting various animals have been placed above the doors in the individual cages to make it easier for children to find the right entrance. One of the most amous landscapes from this area are the strings stretched between the windows, on which the residents dry their laundry on warm days.





TIt was an old field, which we called after the then owner - the old Mazurczak's field. He is surely dead by now. Various types of metal elements could be found there. When we were children, we built hideouts there. There were also fruit trees there, we used to climb them - to pick plums. Lots of fun! Anna



I was looking for the optimal route to Brochów once. I knew one passage before, but not the other. The muddy road between the plots leads to an unlit, post-German tunnel under the tracks, where the Brochówka river flows. Then it opens up to the sky, goes right next to the river bank, and then into another tunnel under the next tracks. This place looks like a forgotten secret passage. Aleksandra





Whenever I go for a walk after a Holy Mass and look at the place where a shooting range and a hotel are now, I can see the lake that used to be there, and the meadows where cattle grazed. We went fishing in summer and ice skating in winter. My brother - a sailor, tried on this lake the first boat he built. In the evening and at night, you could hear in the house the croaking of frogs and the chirping of crickets. Maria



The sounds of passing trains lulled us to sleep. Not those high-speed ones, like today. The old ones, from these times, made a specific noise. We loved the trips to two bridges where we waited for a train to pass. We announced our presence with shouting and waving our hands, and the engine-driver always replied with a loud signal. I really like (and recommend to everyone) the walks along the so-called *Kilometre* Bridge over the meadows, offering beautiful views. It is not uncommon to come across herds of roe deer, pheasants or storks there. Maria

In our collective consciousness it is the so-called Kilometre Bridge. I do not even know if it really is a bridge as it does not actually go over any water. In the article by "Radio Wrocław" the bridge is described as the longest passage. I do not remember, however, whether this information relates to the territory of Poland or to the whole of Europe. I was a student of the primary school no. 29 at Opolska Street. I remember from my school days the large, wooden green desks with a place for an inkwell. In every classroom there was a stove, which was fired up during winter. The windows overlooked a field. Sometimes a cow or pigs broke into this field - we stopped our lessons then to chase out these uninvited quests. This building currently houses a large medical laboratory. Maria



Many nice childhood memories are associated with the tenement house at 119 Opolska Street, adjacent to the tenement house number 117. These are two old tenement houses joined together. The backyard behind them has survived to this day. This fact is significant because a new housing estate was built around it - the so-called Stoneczne housing estate. All of my grandpa's neighbours who lived in the tenement house at ul. Opolska had farm animals: rabbits, martens, coypu, pigs etc. One of the most memorable scenes from my childhood was a pig -slaughtering in the backyard. If I remember correctly, all the neighbours participated in it. The site of this pig-slaughtering still exists today.

The story is related to the **flood**. At that time, there was a system of signs that required going up to the roof in order to signal the need for help. There were signs - a white flag, as well as other colours. I remember that my grandpa and a neighbour went onto the roof and called for help by accident. The helicopter that began to land almost blew them off that roof. I think they went to adjust the antenna. One of them must have been wearing something white. and that confused the rescuers. Jakub



In the area where the so-called Sioneczne housing estate was built I helped my grandpa dig up potatoes. There were huge fields developed by the neighbours. Today the housing estate has the following numbers 119: A, B, C, D... I do not remember up to which letter. Even though the housing estate is 10 years old, postmen and couriers often have problems with delivering parcels. Jakub
